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J- 1. Number and Area of Census Farms and Commercial Farms, Newfoundland and Labrador, By Census Division, 1961 and 1966

Definitions and Explanations:

Census Farms:

A census farm is defined as an agricultural holding of one acre or more with sales of agricultural products, during the 12-month period prior to the census, of \$50 or more.

Commercial Farms:

A commercial farm is defined as a census-farm with values of sales of agricultural products, during the 12-month period prior to the census, of \$2,500 or more (excluding "institutional farms", etc.).

It should be noted that variations in agricultural production and prices of agricultural products affect the number of commercial farms. Between 1960 and 1965 the farm index of prices of agricultural products for Canada increased from 250.0 to 282.1.

Definitions and Explanations:

Census Farms:

See Table J-1.

Farm-Population:

All persons living in a dwelling situated on a census farm as defined in the census, were considered to be farm population, regardless of their occupation. In the case of institutions located on a census farm, only the manager hired agricultural workers and members of their households were included with this population.

Census Farm Areas:

Crown lands, usually pasture land, which were operated under a lease arrangement with Federal, Provincial or Municipal governments are reported as part of the farming operation of the person to whom the land was leased. However, land which was used under a per head grazing permit or fee is not included.

Large areas of timber land or other non-agricultural land held by a census farm operator, but operated apart from the farm business, are excluded.

Operator:

This term is used in the Census of Agriculture to designate the person who is directly responsible for the agricultural operation of the holding, whether as owner, tenant or hired manager. As only one operator is listed for each census farm, the number of operators is the same as the number of census farms. If, for example, the holding was operated as a partnership, only one partner was considered to be the operator.

Tenure of Operator:

Agricultural holdings are classified by tenure depending on whether the operator owns, rents or manages the census farm. A fully owned holding means the operator holds the title or deed to all the land he operates, or has a purchase agreement for same. It does not necessarily mean that the property is free of debt. The term "partly owned-partly rented" refers to instances where the operator owns only part of the land he operates and rents or leases the remainder. When the operator manages the whole census farm for someone else, it is classed as managed.

If the holding is only partly managed, then for tenure purposes, the managed portion is considered to be owned. For example, a census farm, which is partly managed and partly rented, is classed as partly owned-partly rented.

Leased land is included with rented land.

Use of Land:

All census farm land is classified according to use, with each acre included in only one of the categories:

Improved land--The area of improved land consists of the total of the areas reported for the four

land categories listed below, namely, area under crops, improved pasture, summer fallow, and other improved land.

Area under crops—Included in this item is the total area of cropland sown or to be sown for harvest. It is the total area of all field crops, and fruits, vegetables, nursery and greenhouse products. Because some crops are reported in fractions of an acre there may be slight differences between the sum of the individual crop acreages and the total cropland. Where intercropping or double cropping is practised, the land area was to be reported only once in the category "area under crops", but the areas of each crop were included with the individual crop acreages.

Improved Pasture—All land which has been cultivated and seeded to pasture and was used for grazing is included in this item. Natural prairie or hay land that was pastured after the crop had been removed is not included.

Summer Fallow—Land from which no crop was to be harvested but which was to be cultivated, or worked during the year for weed control and/or for moisture conservation is included in this category. Areas which were sown to a crop with the intention of ploughing the crop under as green manure were enumerated as summer fallow, but land ploughed or cultivated in the summer after a crop (such as hay or fall rye) had been harvested, was to be enumerated as cropland.

Other improved land—This item includes the area of barnyards, home gardens, lanes and roads on census farms. It also includes areas of cultivated land that were lying idle, being neither summer-fallowed nor cropped, and areas of new breaking that had not been seeded to a crop. Acreages from which sod is being sold for lawn sodding purposes are also included in this item.

Woodland—This includes census farm woodlots, land leased for cutting, sugar bush and cutover land with young growth which has or will have value as timber, fuelwood or Christmas trees. The area of trees planted for windbreakers was also to be included. It excludes large timber tracts which are run as a separate business from the census farm.

Other unimproved land—Areas of natural pasture or hay land that had not been cultivated, brush pasture, grazing or waste land, slough, marsh and rocky land, etc., are all included in this item.

Total Capital Value:

This is the value of census farm capital: land and buildings, machinery and equipment (including automobiles), livestock and poultry. Census farm operators were asked to give a value for land and buildings, farm machinery and equipment on their holding regardless of ownership. The value reported was to be an estimate of the market value, not the original, replacement or assessed value.

The value of land and buildings was to be the value of the property when being used for agricultural purposes. For areas surrounding cities or towns, the real estate value (for subdivision, industrial, or other non-agricultural purposes) of the census farm property was not to be reported.

The value to be reported for farm machinery was the present market value—that is, the amount for which the machinery and equipment would sell if there was a willing buyer and a willing seller, and not a forced sale. It might be explained as the price the machine would likely bring, in its present condition, at an auction sale or the amount the operator would be willing to pay for the machine if he was buying one of the same make, age and condition. The original value or replacement value was not to be reported unless it conformed with the market value.

The total value of machinery and equipment includes the value of items not reported separately as well as the value of the machines which are reported separately.

Values for the livestock and poultry reported in the census were compiled from data on average farm values for the various types of livestock and poultry obtained by the Agriculture Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in a special sample survey.

Machinery and equipment—The number and value was to be reported for agricultural machines on the holding at the census date, regardless of whether the machines were owned by the operator or someone else. Old machines no longer being used were not to be reported. Equipment owned in partnership was to be reported on the census farm where it was located.

Type of Farm:

Dairy:

51.0 per cent or more of the total sales of agricultural products obtained from dairy products:
or

40.0 to 50.9 per cent of total sales of agricultural products obtained from dairy products, provided that the sale of dairy products together with the sale of cattle and calves amount to 51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products.

Cattle, hogs, sheep (excluding farms qualifying as dairy):

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of cattle, hogs and sheep (including wool).

Poultry:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of poultry and poultry products.

Field crops, other than small grains:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of field crops, other than grains. Crops included are hay and forage crops (including forage crop seed), potatoes, sugar beets, other roots, tobacco and field crops not elsewhere specified.

Fruits and vegetables:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of fruits and vegetables (including vegetable seed, but excluding potatoes and turnips).

Forestry:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of forest products. Maple products are not included.

Miscellaneous specialty:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from any one of the groups of products listed below:

fur-bearing animals and pelts:

honey and beeswax;

maple products;

nursery and greenhouse products;

horses;

other agricultural products such as goats and goat milk.

Mixed:

Livestock combination — 51.0 per cent or more of the total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of livestock and livestock products. Items included are those included in the specialty group of dairy, cattle, hogs, sheep, and poultry.

Field crops combination — **51.0 per cent** or more of the total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of all field crops. Items included are those included in the specialty groups of wheat; small grains; and fieldcrops, other than small grains.

Other combinations — This is a residual group and includes all farms not qualifying for any of the above types.

- Value of agricultural products sold:**
Includes the value of sales of all agricultural products sold from each census farm including products traded or exchanged, whether received by the operator or some other person. For tenant-operated farms, the landlord's share of products sold is included. Products of an institutional farm used by the institution were considered sold.
Agricultural sales are reported for the preceding calendar year or for the 12-month period ending May 31 of the census year.
When no sales data were reported, such as in the case of crop failure or census farms operated for the first time in the census year 1966, an estimate of sales was usually made based on reported crop and livestock inventories.
