Definitions and Explanations:

From 1949 to 1956 the statistics are based on the Standard Industrial Classification and "Activity" concept. From 1957 to 1960 the statistics are based on the Revised Standard Industrial Classification and "New Establishment" concept. From 1961 to 1967 the statistics are based on the Revised Standard Industrial Classification and "New Establishment Concept" and total activity concept. Thus from 1961 onward sales and distribution workers and non-manufacturing production workers (new construction by own employees, for example) are included for the first time as a result of the implementation of the total activity concept.

While the revised Standard Industrial Classification has only been in effect since 1961, the data on the "Principal Statistics of Pulp and Paper Mills" has been revised back to 1957 in the 1961 booklet. Prior to 1957 the data is on the original concepts. For a full description of the changes embodied in the Standard Industrial Classification see the explanatory note under "Manufacturing", or consult the *Standard Industrial Classification Manual*, Catalogue No. 12-501.

For the years 1949, 1950, 1951, and 1953 in Table L-1, three establishments are shown. At that time, in addition to the two present pulp and paper mills, a pulp mill was also established at Bishops Falls which pumped the raw pulp overland from Bishops Falls to the mill in Grand Falls.

The man-hours of production and related workers in manufacturing activity represent total man-hours paid (total hours at work during the calendar year plus hours not worked but nevertheless paid for, such as paid vacations, sick leave, statutory holidays, etc.).

L- 2. Principal Statistics of Sawmills and Planing Mills, Newfoundland Labrador, 1957 to 1967

Definitions and Explanations:

Note that the statistics on planing mills are only included from 1962 onward. From 1957 to 1961 the Principal Statistics only include sawmill statistics.

Working owners and partners are not being included in the statistics of employees and salaries and wages. There may be some duplication in numbers when a person owns more than one establishment and is reported as a working owner on each census return.

Withdrawals of working owners are defined as amounts withdrawn by owners or partners for normal living expenses excluding withdrawals for payment of income tax.

L- 3. Principal Statistics of the Logging Industry, Newfoundland and Labrador, 1963 to 1967

Definitions and Explanations:

See L-1, L-2 and N-1.

A logging establishment is a unit which is engaged in logging and related activities (such as felling, bucking, skidding, hauling, trucking, booming, towing, etc.). In most cases the establishment coincides with the firm. However, firms that have more than one establishment are requested to submit a separate census of logging report for each logging establishment which can meet the reporting requirements under the definition of an "establishment".

The number of establishments represents the number of operating units that are principally engaged in logging activities. These units do not represent the total number engaged in logging operations. Numerous logging operations are conducted by establishments classified to other industries (e.g., the sawmill industry) and by farmers and other individuals.

Employees:

The average number of production and related workers engaged in logging is calculated by dividing the reported number of man-days paid during the year by 270. The number of man-hours

paid is calculated on the basis of 9 hours per day. It should be noted that the division of hours paid into production and related workers payrolls results in average hourly earnings and does not represent hourly wage rates which are collected and published by the Department of Labour and which are based on selected occupations.

The value added by logging does not coincide with the value added shown in table F-4 because of the difference in the treatment of stumpage. In this table stumpage is treated as an input for the purchase of raw materials (standing timber), whereas, in F-4 stumpage is treated as a tax and is not extracted.

Definitions and Explanations:

Production and Related Workers In Manufacturing Activity:

Production and related workers in manufacturing activities include those engaged in production and assembling activities, and employees engaged in maintenance, repair, janitorial and watchmen services and line supervisors (working foremen) engaged in similar work to that of the employees they supervise. Production and related workers engaged in manufacturing activity are reported as those receiving pay during the last pay period of each month, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by 12. This procedure is followed even though the establishment did not operate in all months in order to arrive at equivalent annual full-time employment.

The man-hours of production and related workers in manufacturing activity represents total man-hours paid. This includes total hours at work during the calendar year, plus hours not worked but nevertheless paid for, such as paid vacations, sick leave, statutory holidays, etc.

It should be noted that the division of hours paid into production and related workers' payrolls, results in average hourly earnings and does not represent hourly wage rates which are collected and published by the Department of Labour and which are based on selected occupations.

Other:

Other production and related workers refer to employees on manufacturing establishments' payrolls engaged in activities such as construction undertaken for the use of these establishments, some outside piece-workers employed in certain industries, logging employees who are reported as part of the manufacturing establishment and any other production workers who are not engaged in manufacturing-type operations.

Administrative and Office Employees:

Administrative and office employees includes all executive and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, comptrollers, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional, technical and research employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the line supervisor or working foreman level, and clerical staffs. Also included are employees in activities such as advertising, credit collections, purchasing, personnel, legal, medical, etc.

Sales and Distribution:

Sales and distribution workers include office personnel whose salaries are charged to selling expenses, travelling salesmen, driver salesmen, delivery truckdrivers and their helpers, etc. It may also include some sales employees who are reported as part of a manufacturing establishment but are not

working at the establishment's location. The figures exclude persons working on a commission basis who are not considered regular employees of the establishment.

Total Employees:

Total employees include all employees in the above categories including employees located at separately situated head offices and auxiliary units.

Salaries and Wages:

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of employees before deductions for income tax and employees contributions to social services such as sickness, accident, and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc. They include all salaries, wages, bonuses, and profits shared with employees, the value of room and board where provided, commissions (paid to regular employees only) as well as any other allowance forming part of the worker's earnings. Payments for overtime are included .

Definitions and Explanations:
This table is not comparable with table L-2. Table L-2 shows only those establishments primarily engaged in sawing and planing lumber and those producing ties, spoolwood, lath and other mill products. This table shows the record of all licences issued, and the amount of lumber produced. Anyone who cuts lumber in Newfoundland is required to have a licence. Many of the people who produce lumber use it for their own purposes, or sell it privately, and therefore, do not come under the classification of an "establishment". Thus the number of sawmill licences issued is much greater than the number of establishments shown in Table L-2.
