

PREFACE

It has been evident for a number of years that a publication containing detailed statistical information on Newfoundland and Labrador was urgently required. This need has been expressed repeatedly by various royal commissions, by numerous departments and agencies of all levels of government, by consultants and researchers and by the general public. The publication of this volume of statistics will help to alleviate the necessity of referring to numerous sources for required data.

This original publication is designed to be a foundation document. It is intended to release annual supplements updating the data presented in each of the tables contained in this volume and adding newly developed statistical series. The supplementary volumes will be much less comprehensive in terms of the period covered and they will not contain the elaborate explanatory notes supplied in this issue. However, it is hoped that the issuance of annual supplements will provide a means of maintaining a comprehensive collection of up-to-date statistical information for Newfoundland and Labrador.

The material selected for inclusion in this volume has been assembled for presentation in 23 sections. Each section contains a brief introduction which provides the source of the data for each table, as well as definitions, explanations and comments relating to the statistics. In each section the introduction is followed immediately by the statistical tables.

Much of the data contained in this original issue was obtained from publications which have been prepared and released by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. A limited amount of published and unpublished material was also obtained from Federal and Provincial Government departments and agencies. In addition, some previously unpublished statistical information was acquired from various divisions of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

In assemblying this statistical volume no attempt was made to confine the search for information to any particular period of time. Indeed, efforts were made to go back as far as possible in constructing time series. However, in many cases these efforts were limited by changing statistical concepts and classifications, data inconsistencies and a lack of reliable source material. Much of the information presented will be found useful by persons engaged in planning and performing social and economic studies. Therefore, wherever possible, time series have been presented both in seasonally adjusted and unadjusted forms to facilitate economic analysis and forecasting.

Nevertheless, it is extremely difficult to design a useful information guide without knowing the full interests and needs of those who will ultimately use the material presented. For this reason a "mail back" information card has been included at the back of this volume. It is designed to aid in improving the usefulness of the series presented in subsequent publications by permitting adjustment to be made in the subjects presented in response to reader reaction and need. All suggestions, criticisms and corrections will be appreciated.

Rural and Urban:

The "urban" population in the 1956 Census included all persons residing in cities, towns and villages of 1,000 population and over, whether incorporated or unincorporated as well as the population of all parts of census metropolitan areas and other major urban areas; the remainder was classified as "rural".

In 1961 and 1966 all cities, towns and villages of 1,000 or over, whether incorporated or not, were classed as "urban", as well as urbanized fringes of (a) cities classed as metropolitan or other major urban areas, and (b) certain smaller cities where the population of the city (or town) together with its urbanized fringe amounted to 10,000 or more. The remainder of the population was classed as "rural".

Rural Farm and Rural Non-Farm:

Population, households and families are classified as "farm" or "non-farm" depending upon whether or not they were residents of a dwelling situated within the boundaries of a farm located in a rural area. A farm for 1951 and 1956 was defined as a holding of: (1) three acres or more in size, or (2) from one to three acres with agricultural production in 1950 and 1955 valued at \$250 or more. This differs from 1961 and 1966 when a farm was defined as a holding of one or more acres with sales of agricultural products of \$50 or more. All persons living on such holdings in rural areas are classed as "rural farm" regardless of their occupation. These figures do not include the farm operators and their families who operated farms but resided in neighbouring towns and villages at the census date. Such persons were not considered to be living on farms and their dwellings were classified as "urban" or "rural non-farm" rather than "rural farm" dwellings. Also, farm totals do not include persons living on farms in urban areas.

Household:

For census purposes, a household consists of a person or group of persons occupying one dwelling. It usually consists of a family group, with or without lodgers, employees, etc. However, it may consist of a group of unrelated persons, of two or more families sharing a dwelling, or of one person living alone. Every person is a member of some household, and the number of households equals the number of occupied dwellings. A dwelling is a structurally separate set of living quarters with a private entrance from outside or a common hall or stairway inside. Entrance must not be through anyone else's living quarters.

Type of household:

Households are classified as to whether they consist of one family, two or more families, or are non-family households, and whether additional persons such as relatives or lodgers are present.

In a one-family household, the family is usually that of the household head, but it may be one living as a related, lodging or other type of family with a household head who is a non-family person.

Similarly in two or more family households, one family may be that of the household head, or the household head may be a non-family person with whom two or more families are residing.

Non-family households are constituted either of one person living alone, or of a group of two or more persons not in families but living together as a household.

Average number of persons per household is based on private households since collective households are excluded from the data in this review.

A census family consists of a husband and wife (with or without children who have never married), or a parent with one or more children never married, living together in the same dwelling. Adopted children and stepchildren are counted as own children, and in fact, a family, for census purposes, may comprise a man or woman living with a guardianship child or ward under 21 years of age. It should be noted that the term "children" refers to children in families who have never married, who are under 25 years of age, living at home at the census date.

Once a child is married, he or she ceases to be considered a part of the parents' family, for census purposes, even though living in the same household. Such married children when living with husband or wife and/or children constitute a second family unit within the same household.



Definitions and Explanations:

Doctors:

All medical practitioners within the Province are required by law to register with the Newfound-land Medical Board. The figures shown represent the Medical Boards estimate of the average annual number of active resident medical practitioners for the representative calendar year. These estimates have been adjusted for net migration.

Registered Nurses:

All Registered Nurses active within the Province, whether full or part time, are required to register with the Association of Registered Nurses of Newfoundland. The figures shown represent the total number of nurses registered in the representative calendar year who were classed as active at the time of registration. Because of migration and adjustments during the year for activity and inactivity this figure does not necessarily represent the average annual number of nurses active in the Province within a year.

Operating Hospital:

An operating hospital is defined by D.B.S. as an institution which is operated for the medical, surgical and/or obstetrical care of in-patients, and which is licensed or approved as a hospital by the federal and/or provincial government, or by a municipality duly authorized under the laws of the province. Specifically included are institutions primarily for the treatment of tuberculosis, mental disease and mental defect.

Rated Bed Capacity:

Rated bed capacity is defined as the number of beds and cribs or of bassinets for newborn, that the hospital (or unit of the hospital) is designed to accommodate as at December 31 of the reporting year.

Admission:

An admission is defined as the formal acceptance and reception of a person as an in-patient (including infants born alive in the hospital).

In-patient:

An in-patient is defined as a patient who is duly admitted to the hospital and to whom a bed, crib or bassinet has been allocated. (This category includes stillbirths as well as patients attending a day or night centre attached to the hospital).

Public Hospital:

A Public Hospital is defined as one recognized by the Province as a "Public Hospital" which is not operated for profit and accepts all patients regardless of ability to pay.

General Hospital:

A General Hospital is defined as a hospital which provides for the treatment and care of all types of diseases or at least a wide range of conditions.

Chronic, Convalescent and Rehabilitation Hospitals:

Defined as hospitals which primarily provide for the treatment of conditions requiring long-term care or for treatment of patients who are considered to be in the recovery stage of illness, especially where this is a long-term process, and for those patients who are being rehabilitated.

Other Hospitals:

Other Hospitals are defined as those which primarily provide for the treatment of a particular type of disease, condition or case such as maternity, communicable disease, orthopaedic, neurological and cancer, or a hospital which provides a combination of various types of service which cannot be classified into chronic, convalescent or rehabilition.

Commencing January 1966 a number of persons in receipt of Old Age Assistance were phased to Old Age Security. Persons who did not qualitfy for Old Age Security were transferred to Long Term Assistance commencing January 1, 1968.

As of January 1969 some 1,250 to 1,300 persons were transferred from Disabled Persons Allowance to Long Term Assistance. Those remaining in receipt of Disabled Persons Allowance after that time did not qualify for Long Term Assistance.

Long Term Social Assistance in Cash:

Long Term Social Assistance is assistance granted for a period of six months or more to those who qualify. Persons in receipt of Long Term Assistance are those who for social or physical reasons are unable to maintain themselves or their families. Those persons in question are the incapacitated, disabled, long term sick, widows, deserted wives, etc. Females of 50 years and over and males of 65 years and over automatically qualify on application.

Short Term Assistance in Kind:

Short term assistance is that granted on a monthly basis up to a period of six months to the temporary sick and temporary unemployed. Due to changes in the concept of short term assistance, persons in receipt of food orders only have been given. In addition, assistance in kind is given in the form of fuel, rent, clothing, household maintenance and utility.

Employed:

- (b) Did any work which contributed to the running of a farm or business operated by a related member of the household; or
- (c) Had a job, but were not at work, because of bad weather, illness, industrial dispute, or vacation, or because they were taking time off for other reasons.

Persons who had jobs but did not work during the reference week and who also looked for work are included in the unemployed as persons without work and seeking work.

Unemploved:

The unemployed includes all persons who, through the reference week:

- (a) Were without work and seeking work, i.e., did not work during the reference week and were looking for work; or would have been looking for work except they were temporarily ill, were on indefinite or prolonged layoff, or believed no suitable work was available in the community; or
- (b) Were temporarily laid off for the full week, i.e., were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off for less than 30 days.

Not in the Labour Force:

Those not in the labour force include all civilians 14 years of age and over (exclusive of institutional population) who are not classified as employed or unemployed. This category includes those: going to school; keeping house; too old or otherwise unable to work; and voluntarily idle or retired. Housewives, students and others who worked part-time are classified as employed. If they looked for work they are classified as unemployed.

The 1961 Census labour force includes all persons 15 years of age and over, who were reported as having a job of any kind, either part-time or full-time (even if they were not at work) or were reported as looking for work, during the week prior to enumeration. It should be noted that this Census definition of Labour Force differs from the definition used in the Special Labour Force Survey (see C-1). Occupational Classification:

Occupations are classified under group titles, mainly according to the kind of processes performed and the material worked upon, though certain classes take into consideration training and skill, tools and equipment used and/or working environment, etc. All persons are classified according to the nature of their work regardless of the kind of establishment in which it is carried on or their status in that establishment.

Educational Level:

This refers to the highest grade or year of schooling ever attended.

Fishermen, Trappers and Hunters:

Census figures show what appears to be an unrealistic decline in the number of Fishermen, Trappers and Hunters from 1951 to 1961. The Census Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics explain this drastic drop as a result of various factors. They feel that there was a poor count of the inactive seekers of work, and many of these did not get counted in the labour force at all. They also point out that there was a difference in the phrasing of the question relating to activity in 1961, and this caused a drop in their assessment of the number of self-employed fishermen perhaps accentuated by the late start of the fishing season in 1961. The census statistics do show a major drop in the number of self-employed fishermen in Newfoundland and Labrador; from 16,663 in 1951 to 5,974 in 1961, some of whom were, however, recorded as working in the previous twelve months. During this same period the number classed as employees actually increased from 1,324 to 1,996. The relevant statistics are as follows:

Wages and salaries are specified to include living allowances, bonuses, commissions, and "tips" and is measured prior to deductions of all kinds (income tax, employees' contributions to the Unemployment Insurance Fund and to welfare and pension funds, etc.). Both money payments and payments in kind (i.e. free board and lodging) made to, or on behalf of, residents of Canada, excluding military pay and allowances, are included in the total of wages and salaries. Retroactive wage payments are included in the month in which they are paid. Supplementary labour income comprises payments made by employers on behalf of their employees in order to provide them with future benefits, either definite or contingent. Specifically, these payments include employers' contributions to employee welfare and pension funds, to workmen's compensation and industrial vacation funds, and to the Unemployment Insurance Fund. Contributions to armed forces pension funds are also included. Labour income is defined as the total of wages and salaries and of supplementary labour income.

Average Weekly Wages and Salaries:

The wages and salaries are derived from payrolls which include gross payments before deductions are made for taxes, unemployment insurance, etc. Included are salaries, straight-time wages, overtime wages, cost-of-living allowances, commissions, payments to persons absent because of holidays, vacations, sickness, etc., and regularly paid incentive, production and shift bonuses.

In contrast to the concept used in D-1, the payroll concept does not include supplementary labour costs, operational costs or payments not related to the reference period. Thus, the data do not include such items as employer's contributions to unemployment insurance, medical plans, workmen's compensation, other welfare plans, the value of room and board, compensation in kind, travelling expenses, retirement gratuities, or bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals. The treatment of vacation stamps is an exception. Although payment of vacation stamps does not relate to the reference period, these payments are included in the payroll data and the employees are considered to be absent without pay during the period they are on vacation.

Industrial Classification:

All reporting establishments are assigned to an industrial class on the basis of their principal activity. If an establishment is engaged in a number of different industrial activities, its principal activity is determined by the net value added by these activities, or, where this is not possible, by the gross revenue obtained from the different activities. When an establishment has very mixed activities, it is not necessarily shifted from industry to industry each time its principal activity changes.

These figures are obtained from a survey which covers larger firms only, that is, firms having 20 or more employees in any month of the year.

Wage Earners:

Wage earners are defined as those employees engaged in actual production and related operations, including working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise. Also included are maintenance, warehouse and delivery staffs, routemen, driver-salesmen, sales clerks in retail stores, waitresses, etc.

Wage earners not receiving pay for any time worked during the reference period are excluded. For example, workers on strike during the reported pay period, or laid off as a consequence of a strike, are not included in the data unless they work part of the week or they draw pay from their employers (e.g. vacation pay). The exclusion of persons affected by industrial disputes is one of the main sources of irregular fluctuations in the series.

Industrial Classification:

All reporting establishments are assigned to an industrial class on the basis of their principal activity. If an establishment is engaged in a number of different industrial activities, its principal activity is determined by the net value added by these activities or, where this is not possible, by the gross revenue obtained from the different activities. When an establishment has very mixed activities, it is not necessarily shifted from industry to industry each time its principal activity changes.

Man-hours:

The man-hours statistics include hours worked by full-time and part-time wage earners, including overtime hours actually worked. Premium or penalty hours credited for purposes of computing overtime payments are excluded. Hours credited to wage earners absent on leave with pay in the reported pay periods are included in the statistics as though the hours had been worked.

Wages:

The wages of reported wage earners are covered. These are gross payments before deductions are made for taxes, unemployment insurance, etc. Included are straight-time wages, overtime wages, cost-of-living allowances, payments to persons absent because of holidays, vacations, sickness, etc., and regularly paid incentive, production and shift bonuses.

The wages concept does not include supplementary labour costs, operational costs or payments not related to the reference period. Thus, the data do not include such items as employer's contributions to unemployment insurance, medical plans, workmen's compensation, or other welfare plans, the value of room and board, compensation in kind, travelling expenses, retirement gratuities, or bonuses paid at irregular or infrequent intervals. The treatment of vacation stamps is an exception. Although payment of vacation stamps does not relate to the reference period, these payments are included in the wages data and the employees are considered to be absent without pay during the period they are on vacation.

Averages:

The average weekly hours figure is obtained by dividing total weekly man-hours by the total number of wage earners who worked those hours. Average hourly earnings are obtained by dividing total weekly wages by total weekly hours. Average weekly wages are obtained by dividing total weekly wages by the total number of wage earners. It should be noted that total hours include overtime hours actually worked and that the wage earner total includes part-time wage earners and casuals working more than the equivalent of one day a week.

Index Numbers:

Index numbers are calculated by dividing the current month's employment by one-twelth of the total base period employment. The current employment consists of all employment in establishments that meet the size criteria in the current period. Base year employment consists of the employment of establishments that had 20 or more persons in any month of 1961.

Second Year:

Students who have earned not less than three credits at the beginning of the academic year are classified as Second-Year students.

Third Year:

Students who have earned not less than eight credits at the beginning of the academic year are classified as Third-Year students.

Fourth Year:

Students who have earned not less than thirteen credits at the beginning of the academic year are classified as Fourth-Year students.

Fifth Year:

Students who have earned not less than eighteen credits at the beginning of the academic year are classified as Fifth-Year students.

Partial Students:

Students who meet the matriculation requirements of the University and who are not doing a full year's work but are permitted, subject to the Residence Requirement, to take courses including evening and Summer courses for credit towards a degree are termed Partial Students.

GROSS PROVINCIAL PRODUCT AND PERSONAL INCOME

F- 1. Total and Per Capita Gross Provincial Product and Personal Income, Newfoundland and Labrador, 1949 to 1968

Source: D.B.S. Estimated Population Of Canada By Province at June 1, 1969, 91-201, (table 1); Gross Provincial Product estimated by Newfoundland Department of Finance, Economics and Statistics Division; Personal Income (Original Concept) from D.B.S. National Accounts, Income and Expenditure, 13-201, 1959, 1962, 1965 to 1967, (table 28); National Accounts, Income and Expenditure, 13-502—Occasional, 1926-1956, (table 28); Personal Income (Revised Concept) from D.B.S., National Accounts, Production and Productivity Division.

Definitions and Explanations:

Gross Provincial Product (G.P.P.):

Gross Provincial Product is defined as the market value of the unduplicated total of goods and services produced in a given period of time (usually a year), by the factors of production which are resident in a particular economy. In other words, G.P.P. is the sum of what accrues to the various factors of production resident in a given economy for their part in the productive process which leads to the final market value of a good or service.

G.P.P. corresponds to the national measurement of output, Gross National Product (G.N.P.). In estimating G.P.P. we should, therefore, attempt to obtain the components of G.N.P. on a provincial basis. However, because of the non-availability of all G.N.P. components on a provincial basis we have used a methodology known as the Income Method of estimating G.P.P. This consists of taking Personal Income (as defined below) as the major components in G.P.P. and adding items which are not components of Personal Income but should be included in G.P.P. (i.e. Retained Earnings and Capital Consumption Allowances); and subtracting items which are in Personal Income but do not result from production (i.e. Transfer Payments). It should also be noted that since G.P.P. includes only returns to factors of production resident within the province, that portion of total market value of goods and services resulting from imports and all income (dividends, interest, etc.) accruing to outside interests are not included in G.P.P.

It should be noted that in 1968 the National Accounts concept of G.N.P. and therefore many of its components was revised. The above methodology of estimating G.P.P. has been based on the original concept of national accounts. Therefore, when comparing G.P.P. (as shown) and Personal Income series the original concept of Personal Income should be used.

Personal Income (Original Concept):

The degree to which the change in the National Accounts concepts will affect both the methodology utilized and the final G.P.P. series resulting for the Province was not determined at the time of publication.

Personal Income (Original Concept) measures all income received by Canadian residents and includes factor income of persons; transfer payments received by persons, such as family allowances, unemployment insurance benefits, social assistance, etc., and types of investment income accumulated on behalf of persons by life insurance companies, private pension funds, and similar institutions. It excludes incomes of factors of production which are not paid out to persons, such as undistributed corporation profits and profits of government enterprises. In the case of farm operators and other unincorporated business, however, the whole net income is included in personal income since it is not statistically feasible to separate withdrawals for personal use from amounts retained in the business. (For further detail on the components of personal income see Table F-2).

Personal Income (Revised Concept):

For the explanation of conceptual changes which have occurred from "Personal Income (Original Concept)" to "Personal Income (Revised Concept)", see F-3; and for further elaboration see D.B.S. National Income and Expenditure Accounts, 1926-1968, dated August 1969.

F- 2. Personal Disposable Income and Personal Income (Original Concept) and its main Components, Newfoundland and Labrador, 1949 to 1967

Source: D.B.S. National Accounts Income and Expenditure, 1962 and 1965 to 1967, 13-201; D.B.S. National Accounts Income and Expenditure 1926-1956, 13-502, Occasional, (tables 28, 30, 31, 33, 34 and 35).

Definitions and Explanations:

Personal Income:

See F-1.

Personal Disposable Income:

Personal Disposable Income is obtained by deducting direct taxes (Income Taxes, Succession Duties, etc.) from personal income. This represents the amount out of which personal expenditure on goods and services is made—the unconsumed residual being personal net savings.

Wages, Salaries, and Supplementary Labour Income:

The estimated total of wages and salaries include all such payments made to residents of Newfoundland and Labrador, including payments in kind such as free board and lodging. It does not include carnings from self-employment or partnerships, income from independent professional practice, income of farmers from farming operations, or military pay and allowances. Wages and salaries are estimated before tax deductions, and before contributions of employees to unemployment insurance, pensions, and other social insurance schemes. Bonuses, commissions, and retroactive wage increases are included in the period in which they are paid because of the statistical difficulties of allocating these items to the period in which they were earned.

Supplementary labour income consists of other expenditures by employers on labour account that can be regarded as payment for employees services. Included here are employer's contributions to pension funds, employee welfare funds, unemployment insurance, and workmen's compensation.

Net Income of Non-Farm Unincorporated Business:

This item includes the net income of all non-farm unincorporated businesses for most industries and also includes the net income of independent professional practitioners such as doctors, dentists, nurses, lawyers and engineers.

Interest Dividends and Net Rental Income of Persons:

This item includes the interest dividends and net rental income of persons from provincial business and from non-resident sources, interest on the public debt received by persons, and the imputed net rent on owner-occupied dwellings.

Government Transfer Payments:

Includes elements of personal income which are not earnings from the production of goods and services e.g., family allowances, old age pensions, outpayments of social insurance and government pensions fund, social assistance, etc.

Other:

The four major components of Personal Income shown in this table will not add to the figure shown for total Personal Income because of the following factors:

- 1. Employer and employee contributions to social insurance and government pension funds are included in the component shown as "Wages, Salaries and Supplementary Labour Income" but are deducted when determining total personal income.
- 2. Military pay and allowances are not included in the component shown as "Wages, Salaries and Supplementary Labour Income" but are included in the total personal income figures.
- 3. Net Income of farm operators from farm production and charitable contributions to persons by corporations are included in "Personal Income" but are not shown as separate components.

For further elaboration see National Accounts, Income and Expenditure, 1967, (tables 7 and 28 to 35).

F- 3. Personal Disposable Income and Personal Income (Revised Concept) and its Main Components, Newfoundland and Labrador, 1949 to 1968

Definitions and Explanations:

As noted in Table F-1 the National Accounts concept of Personal Income has been changed. The series based on the revised concept of Personal Income demonstrates that aggregate Personal Income has decreased slightly for the Province. Major changes in the components of Personal Income from the original to the revised concept were as follows:

- 1. Public hospitals have been transferred from the personal to the government sector. The portion of hospital expenses paid by government on behalf of persons was shown under the original concept as a current transfer from government to persons. With the inception of hospital insurance, and particularly the universal application of the Hospital Insurance and Diagnostic Services Act in 1967, hospitals have increasingly come under the financial and operational control of government departments or agencies, with the purchase of hospital services mainly by government on behalf of individuals. Therefore, in the personal sector, the level of income has been lowered by discontinuing government transfer payments to hospitals.
- 2. Employer and employee contributions to social insurance and public service pensions are now treated as a transfer payment (tax outlay) from persons to government, instead of a deduc-

- tion from personal income. Personal Disposable Income is unaffected, with personal income and tax outlays rising equally.
- 3. Net rental income of persons, formerly classified with interest and miscellaneous investment income, is now included with net income of non-farm unincorporated business.
- 4. Investment income of trusteed pension plans covering government employees has been reclassified to personal investment income from government investment income.
- 5. Employer contributions to pensions of armed forces have been reclassified from wages, salaries and supplementary labour income to military pay and allowances.

Other:

Includes military pay and allowances; Net income of farm operators from farm production; charitable contributions to persons by corporations; Capital assistance to unincorporated business; bad debts written off by persons; and transfers to non-residents.

For further elaboration see D.B.S. National Income and Expenditure Accounts, 1926-1968, dated August, 1969.

F- 4. Census Value Added in Commodity Producing Industries, Newfoundland and Labrador, 1949 to 1967 Source: D.B.S. Survey of Production, 1967, 61-202, (tables 6, 7, and 9 to 15). Definitions and Explanations:

Census value added is obtained by deducting from the gross value of shipments or accrued operating revenue, the cost of intermediate materials, including custom charges. The gross value of shipments is taken exclusive of excise and other sales taxes and is adjusted for changes in inventory of finished goods and goods-in-process.

In some cases several statistical series have been shown within an industry to provide linkages in the data. This was made necessary by changes in classifications and concepts within some commodity producing industries.

The series shown in this table may not necessarily correspond with the net value series shown in the various sector tables in this review because of variations in concepts.

Explanations of conceptual breaks may in most cases be obtained through reference to the source publication (61-202). The following breaks occurred in the census value added series in the period 1949 to 1967:

- 1. Forestry-Break occurs in 1963-see Section L (Forestry) for further explanation.
- 2. Mining-Breaks occur in 1959 and 1961.
- 3. Manufacturing-Breaks occur in 1959 and 1961. See Section N (Manufacturing) for further explanation.
- 4. Construction—Break occurs in 1961.

G- 1. Gross Revenue, Current and Capital Accounts, Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, by Type and Major Source, 1949-50 to 1969-70

Source: Derived from the Public Accounts of the Province of Newfoundland, 1949-50 to 1967-68. Subject to Audit figures for 1968-69 were supplied by the Central Accounts Division, Department of Finance; Data for 1969-70 from Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the Financial Year 1st. April 1969-31st. March 1970, (as approved by the legislature).

Definitions and Explanations:

Gross Current Account Revenue from the Federal Government:

Grants-in-Aid: Includes federal contributions to various shared cost programs, i.e. Technical and Vocational Education, Hospital Insurance, Canada Assistance Plan, Social Assistance, Urban Renewal, etc. Tax Rental and Tax Equilization: From 1949-50 to 1961-62 the Government of Newfoundland rented to the Federal Government its right to impose certain taxes. In lieu of these rights, the Province received from Ottawa sums of money as stated in the tax rental agreements. This money also included adjustments for tax equilization. Since 1962-63 the money previously recorded under the tax rental headings has been allocated under the headings; Succession Duty, Utility Companies Tax, Tax Equalization, and Personal and Corporate Income Taxes (from 1962-63 Personal and Corporate taxes have been determined by Provincial Statute under the Tax Collection Agreement and are shown as Provincial Taxes).

Other: Includes Statutory Subsidies, Atlantic Provinces Adjustment Grants, Award under Term 29, Transitional Grants prior to 1962-63, and Utility Companies Tax and Sucession Duties after 1961-62. Other Provincial Taxes:

Includes Fire Insurance Premium Tax, Insurance Companies Tax, Entertainment, Tobacco, Telegraphic, Pari-mutual, and Mining Tax in 1968-69 and 1969-70.

Other Provincial Sources (Current Account):

Includes Institutional charges for Fees, Medicines, etc.; Recoveries on account of Board and Lodging, Contributions to Pension Funds, Interest, Court Fines, Inland Revenue Stamps, etc.

Other Gross Capital Account Revenue from Federal Government:

Includes contributions towards Roads to Resources, Schools and Housing for Indians and Eskimos. Hospital Construction and Equipment.

Gross Capital Account Revenue from Provincial Government:

Includes contributions towards private and access roads, loan recoveries, earnings on investments, etc. Pre-Union Surplus Account:

Revenue accruing from the liquidation of pre-union assets.

G- 2. Gross Current and Capital Account Expenditures, Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, By Department, 1949-50 to 1969-70

Source: The Public Accounts of the Province of Newfoundland, 1949-50 to 1967-68; Data for 1968-69 supplied by Central Accounts Division, Department of Finance; Data for 1969-70 from Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the Financial Year 1st. April, 1969—31st. March, 1970. (as approved by the legislature).

Definitions and Explanations:

Items classified in the "Public Accounts" as expenditures on account of Pre-union Liabilities for the period 1949-50 to 1955-56 were allocated to Current and Capital Accounts on a basis comparable to the classification of these items in future years. During this period those items classified as Capital Account Expenditures were comprised mainly of the item Expenditures on account of Pre-union Liabilities for the Extension of Public Services.

In 1967-68 a functional budgeting system was adopted by the Province. This means that items such as repair and maintenance, light, heat, power, construction and extension (Department of Public Works) and office equipment and supplies (Department of Supply) were transferred to and reflected in the expenditure of the department which availed of the service. Commencing in 1967-68 transferred items are reflected as expenditures of the recipient department and not in the transferring department. This fact must be considered when analyzing changes in departmental expenditure from the above series, particularly from 1966-67 to 1967-68.

Departmental titles and functions have changed over the years. The following changes occurred in departmental titles in the period 1949-50 to 1969-70:

- 1. The present Department of Mines, Agriculture and Resources: Department of National Resources 1949-50 to 1951-52; Department of Mines and Resources 1952-53 to 1959-60;
- 2. The present Department of Justice:
 Department of the Attorney General prior to 1966-67.
- 3. The present Newfoundland Liquor Commission: Board of Liquor Control prior to 1968-69.
- The present Department of Municipal Affairs & Housing:
 Department of Supply prior to 1952-53;
 Department of Municipal Affairs and Supply 1952-53 to 1965-66;
 Department of Municipal Affairs and Housing 1966-67 to 1969-70.
- 5. The present Department of Fisheries:
 Department of Fisheries and Co-operatives prior to 1957-58.
- 6. The function of Highways, Roads and Bridges was undertaken by the Department of Public Works prior to 1957-58 at which time the Department of Highways was created.
 It should also be noted that in 1968-69 and 1969-70 Sinking Fund expenditures are included under Consolidated Fund Services, Capital Accounts. Prior to this time they were classified as current account expenditures under Consolidated Fund Services.

Definitions and Explanations:

The data shown in Table G-3 will not necessarily correspond to the total expenditure of the department carrying a corresponding title. Items have been transferred between departments which are considered to be of a different functional nature than that performed in a particular department. In essence, the principles of the functional budgeting system adopted in 1967-68 (see notes Table G-2) have been applied to the years 1949-50 to 1966-67. Therefore, functional expenditure figures shown for 1967-68 to 1969-70 will show greater correspondence to department expenditure totals. It was not possible to break out certain current account items functionally in the pre 1967-68 period, i.e., Repair and Maintenance, Light, Heat and Power, etc.

Interest on Public Debt in the period 1960-61 to 1969-70 includes only interest on direct government short-term borrowing and bonded debt. Interest on the borrowings of Crown Building Corporations (Rental Purchase) is not included but has been allocated functionally according to the function of the building on which the interest was paid. In determining total interest paid on borrowings by the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador interest on Crown Building Corporation debentures should be added. These figures, however, should not be added to total expenditures since they have already been transferred functionally as noted above. The redemption of Crown Building Corporation bonds has also been transferred functionally; therefore, the same situation would apply when determining the annual expenditure on debt redemption by the Province. The following are the expenditures on interest and debt redemption of Crown Building Corporations, in the period 1960-61 to 1969-70:

Definitions and Explanations:

The present Consumer Price Index is based on 1961—100 and D.B.S. commenced publishing on this new base in January 1969. This new base replaces that of June 1951 — 100 which had been in effect since the Index was first tabulated in this Province. The present index may be converted to the old base by multiplying the data presented by the following conversion factors: All Items, 1.167; Food 1.113; Housing, 1.130; Clothing, 1.106; Transportation, 1.224; Health and Personal Care, 1.541: Recreation and Reading, 1.509; Tobacco and Alcohol, 0.984.

The Consumer Price Index is based on a sample survey of a given basket of commodities in St. John's and most items are covered on a monthly basis. Each item is then weighed according to a predetermined weighting system and tabulated to form part of the monthly index. Beginning in February 1962, the items included and their relative weights were based on a revision made by D.B.S. in 1957. Prior to this the index was based on weights established by D.B.S. in 1947-1948.

A variety of products are surveyed under each major category, mostly on a monthly basis. There are, approximately 90 items surveyed under Food with the major sub-categories being Restaurant Meals, Dairy Products, Cereal Products, Fats and Oils, Eggs, Meats, Fish and Poultry, Fruits and Vegetables, and Miscellaneous Groceries. Under Housing there are some 58 items with the main sub-categories being Rent, Home Ownership, Fuel and Lighting, Furniture, Appliances, Floor Coverings. Textiles, Utensils and Equipment, Supplies, and Services. In Clothing there are also approximately 58 items covered with the sub-categories being Men's Wear, Women's Wear, Children's Wear, Footwear, Piece Goods, Clothing Services, and Jewellery. Transportation is composed of about 16 items under three sub-headings; Automobile Operation, Local Transportation, and Travel. In the Health and Personal Care category there are approximately 29 items surveyed with the following sub-groups: Doctor, Dentist, Optical Care, Prepaid Medical Care, Pharmaceuticals, Supplies, and Services. Under Recreation and Reading there are 14 items covered and finally under Tobacco and Alcohol there are 4 items surveyed.

In the total index Food and Housing are given the greatest weight followed by Clothing, Transportation, Tobacco & Alcohol, Health & Personal Care, and Recreation & Reading.

J- 1. Number and Area of Census Farms and Commercial Farms, Newfoundland and Labrador, By Census Division, 1961 and 1966

Definitions and Explanations:

Census Farms:

A census farm is defined as an agricultural holding of one acre or more with sales of agricultural products, during the 12-month period prior to the census, of \$50 or more.

Commercial Farms:

A commercial farm is defined as a census-farm with values of sales of agricultural products, during the 12-month period prior to the census, of \$2,500 or more (excluding "institutional farms", etc.).

It should be noted that variations in agricultural production and prices of agricultural products affect the number of commercial farms. Between 1960 and 1965 the farm index of prices of agricultural products for Canada increased from 250.0 to 282.1.

Census Division:

See Map I.

Definitions and Explanations:

Census Farms:

See Table J-1.

Farm-Population:

All persons living in a dwelling situated on a census farm as defined in the census, were considered to be farm population, regardless of their occupation. In the case of institutions located on a census farm, only the manager hired agricultural workers and members of their households were included with this population.

Census Farm Areas:

Crown lands, usually pasture land, which were operated under a lease arrangement with Federal, Provincial or Municipal governments are reported as part of the farming operation of the person to whom the land was leased. However, land which was used under a per head grazing permit or fee is not included.

Large areas of timber land or other non-agricultural land held by a census farm operator, but operated apart from the farm business, are excluded.

Operator:

This term is used in the Census of Agriculture to designate the person who is directly responsible for the agricultural operation of the holding, whether as owner, tenant or hired manager. As only one operator is listed for each census farm, the number of operators is the same as the number of census farms. If, for example, the holding was operated as a partnership, only one partner was considered to be the operator.

Tenure of Operator:

Agricultural holdings are classified by tenure depending on whether the operator owns, rents or manages the census farm. A fully owned holding means the operator holds the title or deed to all the land he operates, or has a purchase agreement for same. It does not necessarily mean that the property is free of debt. The term "partly owned-partly rented" refers to instances where the operator owns only part of the land he operates and rents or leases the remainder. When the operator manages the whole census farm for someone else, it is classed as managed.

If the holding is only partly managed, then for tenure purposes, the managed portion is considered to be owned. For example, a census farm, which is partly managed and partly rented, is classed as partly owned-partly rented.

Leased land is included with rented land.

Use of Land:

All census farm land is classified according to use, with each acre included in only one of the categories:

Improved land-The area of improved land consists of the total of the areas reported for the four

land categories listed below, namely, area under crops, improved pasture, summer fallow, and other improved land.

Area under crops—Included in this item is the total area of cropland sown or to be sown for harvest. It is the total area of all field crops, and fruits, vegetables, nursery and greenhouse products. Because some crops are reported in fractions of an acre there may be slight differences between the sum of the individual crop acreages and the total cropland. Where intercropping or double cropping is practised, the land area was to be reported only once in the category "area under crops", but the areas of each crop were included with the individual crop acreages.

Improved Pasture-All land which has been cultivated and seeded to pasture and was used for grazing is included in this item. Natural prairie or hay land that was pastured after the crop had been removed is not included.

Summer Fallow—Land from which no crop was to be harvested but which was to be cultivated, or worked during the year for weed control and/or for moisture conservation is included in this category. Areas which were sown to a crop with the intention of ploughing the crop under as green manure were enumerated as summer fallow, but land ploughed or cultivated in the summer after a crop (such as hav or fall rve) had been harvested, was to be enumerated as cropland.

Other improved land—This item includes the area of barnyards, home gardens, lanes and roads on census farms. It also includes areas of cultivated land that were lying idle, being neither summer-fallowed nor cropped, and areas of new breaking that had not been seeded to a crop. Acreages from which sod is being sold for lawn sodding purposes are also included in this item.

Woodland--This includes census farm woodlots, land leased for cutting, sugar bush and cutover land with young growth which has or will have value as timber, fuelwood or Christmas trees. The area of trees planted for windbreakers was also to be included. It excludes large timber tracts which are run as a separate business from the census farm.

Other unimproved land—Areas of natural pasture or hay land that had not been cultivated, brush pasture, grazing or waste land, slough, marsh and rocky land, etc., are all included in this item.

Total Capital Value:

This is the value of census farm capital: land and buildings, machinery and equipment (including automobiles), livestock and poultry. Census farm operators were asked to give a value for land and buildings, farm machinery and equipment on their holding regardless of ownership. The value reported was to be an estimate of the market value, not the original, replacement or assessed value.

The value of land and buildings was to be the value of the property when being used for agricultural purposes. For areas surrounding cities or towns, the real estate value (for subdivision, industrial, or other non-agricultural purposes) of the census farm property was not to be reported.

The value to be reported for farm machinery was the present market value—that is, the amount for which the machinery and equipment would sell if there was a willing buyer and a willing seller, and not a forced sale. It might be explained as the price the machine would likely bring, in its present condition, at an auction sale or the amount the operator would be willing to pay for the machine if he was buying one of the same make, age and condition. The original value or replacement value was not to be reported unless it conformed with the market value.

The total value of machinery and equipment includes the value of items not reported separately as well as the value of the machines which are reported separately.

Values for the livestock and poultry reported in the census were compiled from data on average farm values for the various types of livestock and poultry obtained by the Agriculture Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in a special sample survey.

Machinery and equipment—The number and value was to be reported for agricultural machines on the holding at the census date, regardless of whether the machines were owned by the operator or someone else. Old machines no longer being used were not to be reported. Equipment owned in partnership was to be reported on the census farm where it was located.

51.0 per cent or more of the total sales of agricultural products obtained from dairy products:

40.0 to 50.9 per cent of total sales of agricultural products obtained from dairy products, provided that the sale of dairy products together with the sale of cattle and calves amount to 51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products.

Cattle, hogs, sheep (excluding farms qualifying as dairy):

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of cattle, hogs and sheep (including wool).

Poultry:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of poultry and poultry products.

Field crops, other than small grains:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of field crops other than grains. Crops included are hay and forage crops (including forage crop seed), potatoes, sugar beets, other roots, tobacco and field crops not elsewhere specified.

Fruits and vegetables:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of fruits and vegetables (including vegetable seed, but excluding potatoes and turnips).

Forestry:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of forest products. Maple products are not included.

Miscellaneous specialty:

51.0 per cent or more of total sales of agricultural products obtained from any one of the groups of products listed below:

fur-bearing animals and pelts:

honey and beeswax;

maple products;

nursery and greenhouse products;

horses;

other agricultural products such as goats and goat milk.

Mixed:

Livestock combination – 51.0 per cent or more of the total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of livestock and livestock products. Items included are those included in the specialty group of dairy, cattle, hogs, sheep, and poultry.

Field crops combination — 51.0 per cent or more of the total sales of agricultural products obtained from the sale of all field crops. Items included are those included in the specialty groups of wheat; small grains; and fieldcrops, other than small grains.

Other combinations — This is a residual group and includes all farms not qualifying for any of the above types.



From 1961 to 1967 the statistics are based on the Revised Standard Industrial Classification and "New Establishment Concept" and total activity concept. Thus from 1961 onward sales and distribution workers and non-manufacturing production workers (new construction by own employees, for example) are included for the first time as a result of the implementation of the total activity concept.

While the revised Standard Industrial Classification has only been in effect since 1961, the data on the "Principal Statistics of Pulp and Paper Mills" has been revised back to 1957 in the 1961 booklet. Prior to 1957 the data is on the original concepts. For a full description of the changes embodied in the Standard Industrial Classification see the explanatory note under "Manufacturing", or consult the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, Catalogue No. 12-501.

For the years 1949, 1950, 1951, and 1953 in Table L-1, three establishments are shown. At that time, in addition to the two present pulp and paper mills, a pulp mill was also established at Bishops Falls which pumped the raw pulp overland from Bishops Falls to the mill in Grand Falls.

The man-hours of production and related workers in manufacturing activity represent total man-hours paid (total hours at work during the calendar year plus hours not worked but nevertheless paid for, such as paid vacations, sick leave, statutory holidays, etc.).

For further definitions and explanations see N-1.

Working owners and partners are not being included in the statistics of employees and salaries and wages. There may be some duplication in numbers when a person owns more than one establishment and is reported as a working owner on each census return.

Withdrawals of working owners are defined as amounts withdrawn by owners or partners for normal living expenses excluding withdrawals for payment of income tax.

A logging establishment is a unit which is engaged in logging and related activities (such as felling, bucking, skidding, hauling, trucking, booming, towing, etc.). In most cases the establishment coincides with the firm. However, firms that have more than one establishment are requested to submit a separate census of logging report for each logging establishment which can meet the reporting requirements under the definition of an "establishment".

The number of establishments represents the number of operating units that are principally engaged in logging activities. These units do not represent the total number engaged in logging operations. Numerous logging operations are conducted by establishments classified to other industries (e.g., the sawmill industry) and by farmers and other individuals.

Employees:

The average number of production and related workers engaged in logging is calculated by dividing the reported number of man-days paid during the year by 270. The number of man-hours

paid is calculated on the basis of 9 hours per day. It should be noted that the division of hours paid into production and related workers payrolls results in average hourly earnings and does not represent hourly wage rates which are collected and published by the Department of Labour and which are based on selected occupations.

The value added by logging does not coincide with the value added shown in table F-4 because of the difference in the treatment of stumpage. In this table stumpage is treated as an input for the purchase of raw materials (standing timber), whereas, in F-4 stumpage is treated as a tax and is not extracted.

Definitions and Explanations:

Production and Related Workers In Manufacturing Activity:

Production and related workers in manufacturing activities include those engaged in production and assembling activities, and employees engaged in maintenance, repair, janitorial and watchmen services and line supervisors (working foremen) engaged in similar work to that of the employees they supervise. Production and related workers engaged in manufacturing activity are reported as those receiving pay during the last pay period of each month, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by 12. This procedure is followed even though the establishment did not operate in all months in order to arrive at equivalent annual full-time employment.

The man-hours of production and related workers in manufacturing activity represents total man-hours paid. This includes total hours at work during the calendar year, plus hours not worked but nevertheless paid for, such as paid vacations, sick leave, statutory holidays, etc.

It should be noted that the division of hours paid into production and related workers' payrolls, results in average hourly earnings and does not represent hourly wage rates which are collected and published by the Department of Labour and which are based on selected occupations.

Other:

Other production and related workers refer to employees on manufacturing establishments' payrolls engaged in activities such as construction undertaken for the use of these establishments, some outside piece-workers employed in certain industries, logging employees who are reported as part of the manufacturing establishment and any other production workers who are not engaged in manufacturing-type operations.

Administrative and Office Employees:

Administrative and office employees includes all executive and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, comptrollers, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional, technical and research employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the line supervisor or working foreman level, and clerical staffs. Also included are employees in activities such as advertising, credit collections, purchasing, personnel, legal, medical, etc.

Sales and Distribution:

Sales and distribution workers include office personnel whose salaries are charged to selling expenses, travelling salesmen, driver salesmen, delivery truckdrivers and their helpers, etc. It may also include some sales employees who are reported as part of a manufacturing establishment but are not

working at the establishment's location. The figures exclude persons working on a commission basis who are not considered regular employees of the establishment.

Total Employees:

Total employees include all employees in the above categories including employees located at separately situated head offices and auxiliary units.

Salaries and Wages:

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of employees before deductions for income tax and employees contributions to social services such as sickness, accident, and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc. They include all salaries, wages, bonuses, and profits shared with employees, the value of room and board where provided, commissions (paid to regular employees only) as well as any other allowance forming part of the worker's earnings. Payments for overtime are included.

MANUFACTURING

N- 1. Selected Statistics, All Manufacturing Industries, Newfoundland and Labrador, 1957 to 1967 Source: D.B.S. Manufacturing Industries of Canada, 31-204, 1962, 1964 and 1965, (subsection 2); Data for 1966 and 1967 supplied by D.B.S., Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division.

Definitions and Explanations:

D.B.S. provides the following explanation of concepts and definitions concerning manufacturing industries.

General:

The Census of Manufactures is an annual mail survey covering Canada's Manufacturing Industries. It is based on the Standard Classification of Industries and full details concerning the system may be found in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, Catalogue No. 12-501 which is available from the Queen's Printer or the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In summary, the Classification as it relates to the manufacturing industries provides for a breakdown into 140 industries arranged in 20 major industry groups. Of the 140 (3 digit) industries, 18 are further broken down into 56 (4 digit) sub-classes. They cannot all be published separately by province, however, because of the confidential nature of the data in certain provinces.

The reporting unit for the Census is designated as the establishment (see definition of "Establishment" in following section) and a return is requested from every establishment classified to a manufacturing industry. Although respondents are required to submit reports covering the calendar year, financial year reports other than the calendar year are accepted in instances where respondents find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. When an establishment is operated for only part of a year a report is required covering the period of operation.

Since 1960 the following major changes have been implemented in the Census of Manufactures: (a) a revised Standard Industrial Classification (b) a new establishment definition and (c) an extension of the establishment definition to cover the non-manufacturing activities of manufacturing establishments. For a complete description of the procedures followed in establishing the revised series, reference should be made to the Explanatory Notes included in the 1960, 1961 and 1962 industry publications. The statistical framework within which the Census of Manufactures is now carried out is based on the following concepts and definitions which have been developed as part of a general programme to achieve a fully integrated system of economic statistics.

Establishments:

A manufacturing establishment is typically a factory, mill or plant principally engaged in manufacturing activities. The majority of such establishments are firms but many firms have more than one establishment. Such firms are requested to submit a separate Census of Manufactures report for each manufacturing establishment which can meet the reporting requirements embodied in the following definition of the "Establishment":

"The smallest unit which is a separate operating entity capable of reporting the following principal statistics:

Materials and supplies used

Goods purchased for resale as such

Fuel and power consumed

Number of employees and salaries and wages

Man-hours worked and paid

Inventories

Shipments or sales"

Each establishment is required to report on all the activities carried out within its accounting boundaries (except income from investments such as rent, interest and dividends) and data on the different activities (manufacturing, trading in goods not of own manufacture, construction by own labour force, revenue from services, etc.) are requested to be reported separately. It should be noted that the statistics for separate activities are not completely consistent since some respondents cannot distinguish in their records, materials, shipments and inventories relating solely to their own manufacturing activities. For example, inventory of goods purchased for resale may not be distinguishable from inventory of own manufactured goods. Complete consistency, therefore, can be obtained only at the "all operations" (total activity) level and for studies or statistical measures requiring accurate coordinated data, the "total" statistics should be used.

The number of establishments represents the number of operating units that are principally engaged in the activities of the manufacturing industries to which they have been classified. These units do not necessarily represent the total number engaged in the production of a commodity mainly produced in a certain industry. Some commodities are produced as secondary products in other manufacturing and non-manufacturing industries. It should be noted that head offices and auxiliary units which are surveyed separately are not included in the establishment count, (see following notes on head offices and auxiliary units).

Employees:

(a) Production and related workers-Manufacturing activities

In addition to those engaged in production and assembling activities, they include those employed in storing, inspecting, handling, packing, warehousing, etc. They also include employees engaged in maintenance, repair, janitorial and watchman services and line supervisors (working foremen) engaged in similar work to that of the employees they supervise.

(b) Production and related workers-Non-manufacturing activities

Such employees include those on manufacturing establishments' payrolls engaged in activities such as construction undertaken for the use of these establishments, some outside piece-workers employed in certain industries, logging employees who are reported as part of a sawmilling establishment and any other production workers who are not engaged in manufacturing-type operations.

(c) Administrative and office employees

This category includes all executive and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents comptrollers, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional, technical and research employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the line supervisor or working foreman level, and clerical staffs. Also included are employees in activities such as advertising, credit collections, purchasing, personnel, legal, medical, etc. It should be noted that prior to 1961 this category also included working owners and partners. Also included in this category are employees located at head offices or auxiliary units separately located from the establishment; these are generally included in the figures for the province in which they are located.

(d) Sales and distribution workers

This category includes office personnel whose salaries are charged to selling expense, travelling salesmen, driver salesmen, truckdrivers and their helpers, etc. It may also include some sales employees who are reported as part of a manufacturing establishment but are not working at the establishment's location. These are generally broken down by province in cases where more than 15 employees are involved in any one province. The figures exclude persons working on a commission basis who are not considered regular employees of the establishment.

(e) Total employees

This total comprises the foregoing categories including employees located at separately located head offices and auxiliary units. The numbers of employees included under categories (b), (c), and (d) are reported in the form of annual averages and represent as closely as possible full time employment, adjustments are made when reported figures indicate the existence of part time or seasonal employment. In all the above categories, figures on employment refer to the calendar year whether or not other establishment statistics can only be reported on a fiscal year other than the calendar year.

Salaries and Wages:

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of employees before deductions for income tax and employees contributions to social services such as sickness, accident and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc. They include all salaries, wages, bonuses, profits shared with employees, the value of room and board where provided, commissions (paid to regular employees only) as well as any other allowance forming part of the worker's earnings. Payments for overtime are included. Figures on salaries and wages refer to the calendar year.

Fuel and Electricity:

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used (including fuel used in cars, trucks, locomotives, etc.) not to purchases unless the quantities are substantially the same. Any fuel and electricity produced by establishments for internal consumption are not included in the total cost. Values represent laid down cost at the establishment including freight, duty, etc. Although fuel and electricity used is considered part of manufacturing activity it should be noted that it also includes relatively small amounts used in non-manufacturing activities since these cannot be reported separately.

Materials and Supplies:

(a) Manufacturing activities

Figures represent quantities and laid down cost values, at the establishment, of materials, supplies

and purchased components owned and used during the year in manufacturing activities and related processes. These statistics represent only commodity items or physical goods (cost of services or overhead charges such as advertising, insurance, depreciation, etc. are not included) whether purchased from others or received as transfers (in the form of materials, components or semi-processed goods) from other establishments of the reporting company. Included are maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to fixed assets accounts and any amounts charged by other establishments for work done on materials owned by the reporting establishment. Cost of repairs or maintenance done by outside contractors and cost of returnable containers are not included.

(b) Non-Manufacturing activities

1. Purchases for re-sale as such

Figures represent cost of materials or products purchased from others by the reporting establishment (or received as transfers from other establishments of the reporting company) for re-sale as such in the same condition as purchased. Included are any finished products received on consignment from other countries.

2. Other materials and supplies used

Figures represent the cost of materials and supplies, if any, used in new construction and in the production of machinery and equipment (for the use of the reporting establishment) by the establishment's own employees. Included are materials used for any capital repairs and alterations carried out by the establishment's employees. Amounts paid to outside contractors for construction and repair work are not included nor is the cost of purchased machinery and equipment. Also included is the cost of office supplies not chargeable to fixed assets accounts and the cost of such other items of materials and supplies used as food, beverages and supplies for establishment-operated cafeterias and lunch counters, first aid and medical supplies, laboratory supplies, etc.

Shipments:

(a) General

The figures represent revenue from all production, sales, services and related activities of reporting establishments with shipments valued in canadian dollars at the point at which the establishment relinquishes control. The unsold portion at year end of consignment shipments in Canada is treated as inventory and not as shipments but all shipments to foreign countries for which the form B13 "Customs Canada Export" has been completed, are treated as shipments.

In those industries where work on principal products extends over a relatively long period, (Fabricated Structural Metal Industry, Aircraft and Parts Manufacturers, Railroad Rolling Stock Industry and Shipbuilding and Repair Industry) the value of production rather than the value of shipments is recorded. There are certain establishments in other industries which also operate on a basis of progress payments. For these establishments, shipments also adjusted to work put in place on the basis of the net change in progress payments over the year.

(b) Shipments of goods of own manufacture

These figures represent shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting establishments or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting establishments for work done. Included are revenue from repair and custom work, amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by other establishments and the cost (book value) of any goods shipped on a rental basis.

All products and byproducts of own manufacture shipped from the establishment are covered, including transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing plants of the reporting firm, when such units are treated as separate establishments. The value of shipments are net of returned goods, discounts, returns, allowances, sales tax and excise taxes and duties, returnable containers and charges for outward transportation by common or contract carriers. Transportation or delivery expense incurred by the reporting establishment's own carriers are included.

(c) Shipments of goods not of own manufacture

These figures represent the net selling value at establishment (net of discounts, returns, allowances, sales taxes and excise duties and taxes and transportation charges by common or contract carriers) of all products or materials (including products transferred from other establishments of the reporting firm) sold as such in the same condition as purchased or received as transfers. For those industries which ship such goods on a rental basis, the value of shipments represents the book value of these goods. All sales of consignment goods from other countries are included.

(d) Other revenue

Figures represent the book value of fixed assets, if any, (new construction and machinery and equipment including major repairs, alterations, additions, modifications, installation and assembly work) pro-

duced during the year for the use of reporting establishment by the establishment's own employees and for which depreciation accounts are maintained. Included also are any revenues from the sale of electricity and from any operations performed by the establishment's own employees, such as revenue from goods produced or purchased for rental (the book value of such goods are included as part of shipments of goods of own manufacture or shipments of goods not of own manufacture), servicing revenues, commissions on sales (when not included in value of sales), revenue for company-operated cafeterias and lunch counters and revenue from outside installation or construction work not related to the establishment's own products, sale of used materials (excluding sale of used fixed assets) research and development work, etc. As mentioned previously the figures do not include non-operating revenue such as rent, dividends, interest, etc.

Value Added:

(a) By manufacturing activities

Figures are compiled by deducting the cost of manufacturing materials, supplies, etc. and fuel and electricity consumed from the value of shipments of goods of own manufacture adjusted for changes in the value of inventories of finished goods and goods in process.

(b) By non-manufacturing activities

The figures are compiled by deducting the cost of goods purchased for re-sale (adjusted for changes in the value of inventories of goods purchased for re-sale) and the cost of non-manufacturing materials and supplies used from the value of shipments of goods not of own manufacture, plus other revenue.

(c) By total activities

The figures consist of value added by manufacturing activities plus value added by non-manufacturing activities. This total value added figure may, in some cases, be less than value added by manufacturing activities as a result of expenditures associated with non-manufacturing exceeding revenues from such activities or because of a decrease in inventory of goods not of own manufacture exceeding the mark-up on the sale of such goods.

The following industries are included in this category:

Meat Products Industries:

Slaughtering and Meat Processors—Establishments primarily engaged in operating abattoirs, meat packing plants, or in manufacturing prepared meats and meat specialities from purchased carcasses. Important products of establishments classified in this industry are fresh meats, cured and smoked meats, fresh and cured sausages, canned meats, and animal oils and fats.

Poultry Processors—Establishments primarily engaged in killing, dressing, packing or canning poultry. Dairy Products Industries:

Dairy Factories—Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing natural cheese of all kinds; creamery butter; both butter and cheese; condensed, canned or powdered milk; ice cream, frozen desserts such as sherbets and ices, and ice cream mix; pasteurized and bottled fresh milk. Establishments that pasteurize and bottle milk are included in this industry whether or not they sell the milk at retail.

Process Cheese Manufacturers-Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing process cheese, cheese pastes and spreads.

Fish Products Industry:

Fish Products Industry—Establishments primarily engaged in canning, filleting, freezing and curing fish, molluscs or crustaceans or producing fish meal or marine oil. Establishments primarily engaged in processing marine vegetable products are included.

Fruit and Vegetable Canners and Preservers:

Fruit and Vegetable Canners and Preservers—Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing canned and dried fruits and vegetables, fruit and vegetable juices, soups, preserves, jams and jellies, pickles, cider and sauces. Included also are establishments primarily engaged in quick-freezing of fruits and vegetables and processing in SO₂.

Grain Mills:

Feed Manufacturers—Establishments primarily engaged in the production of poultry, turkey, hog, cattle, fur-bearing animal, dog and cat feeds. The feeds contain ground or rolled grains, mill feeds, animal and vegetable proteins, minerals, essential vitamins and antibiotics. Local mixing and custom grinding of grains (feed mills) are included in this industry.

Flour Mills-Establishments primarily engaged in milling flour from grain.

Breakfast Cereal Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing prepared breakfast foods such as: corn, wheat and bran flakes; rolled oats; and other cereals either pre-cooked or to be cooked.

Bakery Products Industries:

Biscuit Manufacturers — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing biscuits, crackers, pretzels and similar "dry" bakery products including ice cream cones.

Bakeries – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing bread, cakes, pastries and similar "perishable" bakery products.

Other Food Processors:

Confectionery Manufacturers — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing candies, chocolates, cocoa products, chewing gum and other confectionery such as salted nuts and popcorn.

Sugar Refineries – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing cane sugar, beet sugar, sugar syrups, molasses and beet-pulp.

Vegetable Oil Mills — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing vegetable oils and their by-products, such as linseed, soybean and cocoanut oil, oilcake meal and linseed meal.

Miscellaneous Food Industries – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing baking powder, flavouring extracts and syrups, malt, milled rice, self-rising and blended flours, macaroni and spaghetti, starch and its products jelly powders, yeast, prepared coconut, powdered eggs, frozen eggs, "health foods", peanut butter and other food specialties not elsewhere classified.

Beverage Manufacturers:

Soft Drink Manufacturers — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing non-alcoholic beverages and carbonated mineral waters or concentrates and syrups for the manufacture of carbonated beverages.

Distilleries – Establishments primarily engaged in producing alcoholic beverages such as whisky, brandy, rum and gin. This industry includes establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing ethyl alcohol whether or not the alcohol is ultimately used to make potable spirits.

Breweries – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing ale, beer, porter, stout and other malt liquors.

Wineries - Establishments primarily engaged in producing wines.

The following industries are included in this category:

Sawmills and Planing Mills: Establishments primarily engaged in sawing lumber (boards, timbers, dimension stock), spoolwood, lath and other mill products such as shingles, cooperage stock and box shook from logs or bolts; in dressing and working lumber to produce standard matched, shiplapped or patterned products.

Sash, Door and Other Millwork Plants: Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing mill products such as sash, doors, window and door frames, interior woodwork, mouldings, and hardwood floor-

ing. This industry also includes establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing precut or pretabricated wooden buildings or prefabricated panels for buildings or in manufacturing laminated beams and structures.

Veneer and Plywood Mills: Establishments primarily engaged in producing plywood or veneer.

Wooden Box Factories – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing wooden boxes, crates. fruit and vegetable baskets. This industry includes establishments making box shook from sawn lumber.

Coffin and Casket Industry — Establishments primarily engaged in the manufacture of coffins, caskets and other morticians' supplies.

Miscellaneous Wood Industries – Establishments primarily engaged in wood preservation; in wood turning and in manufacturing wood products not elsewhere classified. Principal products are beekeepers' and poultrymen's supplies, excelsior, woodenware (clothes pins, washboards, stepladders, pails and tub) sanitary woodwork and particle board. Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing cooperage such as barrels, casks, kegs, and other containers made of staves are included in this industry.

Kraft paper, paperboard or building and insulation board. Barking mills engaged in producing barked or rossed pulpwood are included in this industry.

The following industries are included in this category:

Commercial Printing: Establishments primarily engaged in the production of commercial and/or job printing regardless of the printing method or process used (letterpress, including flexographic-planographic or lithographic; intaglio or gravure; stencil printing or silk screen; etc.).

Platemaking, Typesetting and Trade Bindery Plants: Establishments (trade shops) primarily engaged in providing specialized services to the printing and publishing trades, advertising agencies or others: the making of image bearing photographic films, plates and printers dies of all types; doing typesetting; making binders or covers, doing hand or machine bindery work and allied post-printing converting or finishing operations.

Publishing Only: This industry includes establishments primarily engaged in publishing only and which do no printing. The term "publishing", as applied in this industry, includes publishing of books, newspapers, periodicals, almanacs, maps, guides and similar products.

Publishing and Printing: Establishments primarily engaged in publishing and printing newspapers, periodicals, books, almanacs, maps, guides and the like.

The following industries are included in this category:

Cement Manufacturers — Establishment's primarily engaged in manufacturing hydraulic cement, including Portland, natural masonry and pozzolana cements.

Lime Manufacturers - Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing quicklime, hydrated lime and dead-burned dolomite.

Gypsum Products Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing plaster, plaster board and other products composed wholly or chiefly of gypsum.

Concrete Products Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing concrete products such as building blocks, brick, sewer pipe, tanks, poles and septic tanks. Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing sand-lime brick and blocks are included.

Ready-Mix Concrete Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in mixing and delivering ready-mix concrete.

Clay Products Manufacturers — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing clay brick, roofing, floor and wall tiles, sewer pipe, and other structural clay products. Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing clay products such as pottery, chinaware, and porcelain insulators are also included.

Refractories Manufacturers — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing fire brick, crucibles and other heat resisting clay products such as glasshouse tank blocks, stoppers, floaters, and rings. This industry also includes establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing non-clay refractories and crucibles.

Stone Products Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in cutting, shaping and finishing stone for building and other purposes. Important products of this industry include monuments and tombstones, dimension stone for buildings, slate blackboards and stone furniture.

Mineral Wool Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing mineral wool from materials such as limestone, slag and glass.

Asbestos Products Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing asbestos textiles, packings, brake linings, gaskets, asbestos building materials and other commodities composed wholly or chiefly of asbestos.

Glass and Glass Products Manufacturers – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing flat glass, plate glass, glass containers, glassware, ovenware, glass, brick, fibrous glass products except textile fabrics, mirrors, stained, leaded and ornamented glass, glass novelties and other articles made from glass. This industry includes establishments primarily engaged in etching or painting glass or glassware.

Abrasive Manufacturers — Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing abrasive grinding wheels of emery, carborundum and other natural or artificial materials, abrasive sticks, stones, bricks, paper and cloths and buffing and polishing wheels. This industry includes the manufacture of primary abrasive materials such as fused alumina and silicon carbide.

Other Non-Metallic Mineral Products Industries – Establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing miscellaneous non-metallic mineral products not elsewhere classified, such as mica products, expanded vermiculite, expanded perlite and roofing granules.

Definitions and Explanations:

New Capital Expenditure in Construction:

Includes gross expenditure of business and government on the construction of new physical assets or facilities (as explained below). Includes additions to and replacements, conversions and major alterations of existing physical assets or facilities where structural change has taken place. Also includes the cost of elevators, heating systems, etc., which may be considered an integral part of the building or structure. Excludes expenditures for the acquisition of previously existing assets, machinery and equipment (as defined below), as well as the value of land purchased. However, the cost of site preparation and land improvements is included.

Total Repair and Maintenance Expenditure in Construction:

Gross expenditures on repairs and minor alterations. In general, these expenditures are the costs incurred in the repair and maintenance of existing assets or facilities and do not include major alterations or additions, or the replacement of assets which are normally charged to capital account. Routine maintenance costs, such as char service, oiling or cleaning machinery, sanding and snow removal are not included.

Total New Capital Expenditure in Machinery and Equipment:

Includes installed cost of all new machinery, motors, generators, transformers, etc., and the delivered cost of movable equipment, automobiles, trucks, office furniture and appliances, etc.; whether for own use or to rent to others. Includes imported machinery whether new or used, but excludes expenditures on used machinery and equipment purchased in Canada.

Total Repair and Maintenance Expenditure in Machinery and Equipment:

Expenditures of a similar nature to Repair and Maintenance Expenditures in Construction as defined above.

Physical Assets or Facilities:

Includes buildings; marine assets such as docks, wharves and breakwaters; hard surfaced roads and highways; water drainage and sewer systems; power transmission and distribution lines; bridges; etc. Primary Industries:

Includes agriculture; primary fishing; logging, and mining, quarrying and oil wells.

Manufacturing:

Includes food and beverage industries (including fish product processing); tobacco products: textile and clothing industries: wood product industries; paper and allied industries (including pulp and paper mills); printing, publishing and allied industries; machinery and equipment industries; non-metallic mineral products: petroleum and coal; chemical and chemical product industries: etc.

Utilities:

Includes electric power; gas distribution; water systems; railway, water, motor and air transport; storage; and telephones including telegraph and cable systems; broadcasting: etc.

Trade, Finance, and Commercial Services:

Includes wholesale and retail trade; banks, insurance, trust, loan and real estate industries; laundries and dry cleaners; motion picture theatres; hotels: services to business management and various other recreational and personal services.

Housing, Institutional Services and Government Departments:

Includes residential housing, churches, universities, schools, hospitals, etc.

Statistics shown for the value of construction include all costs incurred, directly and indirectly, by the firm paying for the erection of a new structure.

Repair construction includes minor renovations and alterations. As far as possible, snow removal, flushing and sanding of streets and general day-to-day maintainance such as char services are excluded.

Dwelling Unit:

A structurally separate set of living premises with a private entrance either outside the building or from a common hall, lobby, vestibule or stairway inside the building. The entrance must be one that can be used without passing through anyone else's living quarters.

Start:

A Start is recorded when the footing has been installed, that is, when the concrete has been poured for the whole of the footing around the structure.

Completion:

A Completion is the stage at which all the proposed construction work on a dwelling unit has been performed.

For multiple-dwelling structures, the definition of a Start or Completion applies to the structure rather than to the individual dwelling units therein.

Under Construction:

The number of units "Under Construction" at the end of a period takes into account certain adjustments which are necessary for various reasons. For example, after a start on a dwelling has been made, construction may cease, or a structure when completed may contain more or fewer dwelling units than were reported when construction commenced.

Single detached: This type is commonly called a "single house". It contains only one dwelling unit which is completely separated on all sides from any other dwelling or structure.

Single attached: This category includes dwelling units separated by a common wall extended from ground to roof. Single attached dwellings in structures consisting of only two dwelling units are classified as single attached (double). All other single attached dwellings whether in rows of three or more dwellings or simply a unit adjoining a store or other non-residential structure, are classified as single attached (other).

Apartments and flats: These units include not only dwellings contained in structures originally designed, or structurally converted to provide more than one dwelling unit, but also all other dwellings of the apartment or flat-type which may be contained within a residential structure or a non-residential structure.

A vessel is classed as being in coastwise service if (1) it is of Canadian or British Commonwealth registry, sails between two Canadian ports, and loads or unloads no foreign freight; or (2) it is of foreign registry, but is granted a waiver to engage in coastwise shipping.

A vessel's arrival and departure at ports on a voyage could vary between foreign or coastwise depending on which definition of service is applicable. Because of the variety that is possible in vessel movements, the number of arrivals and departures in either international seaborne or coastwise shipping need not necessarily be the same. In addition, beginning the count of vessel arrivals and departures on January 1 and ending it on December 31 can cause a disparity in the total number arrived and departed. Vessels entering a port at the end of a year and clearing it the following January would only be counted as an arrival or departure for that year when the movement occurred.

ELECTRIC POWER

General Note:

In the following tables, wherever reference is made to D.B.S. "Electric Power Statistics", (57-202), it should be noted that prior to 1956 this publication was entitled "Central Electric Stations".

Most of the following tables only go back as far as 1956 because in that year D.B.S. undertook a reclassification of power producers. The earlier statistical series were limited to organizations selling power to the public and these organizations were called Central Electric Stations. Most were electric utilities although a few were industrial establishments which sold a limited amount of power to their own employees or to a nearby municipality.

The major difference between the old series and the new is that several blocks of power previously treated as sales by a central electric station to an industrial customer are now treated as energy produced by an industrial establishment for its own use. Organizations whose primary function is to sell the electricity they generate or purchase are classified as utilities. Those generating power primarily for use in their own industrial operations, principally manufacturing or mining (e.g. Price Newfoundland Limited—see Table S-1) are classified as industrial establishments.

All energy sales and transfers between power producers have been allowed for in the statistics so that duplications are excluded.

Definitions and Explanations:

The total power generated as shown in this table does not coincide with the total generation shown in Table S-2. The reason is that Table S-1 does not show all energy generated. This table was derived from statistics supplied by the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities. Their data applies to utilities which sell electric power publicly, since other sales do not have to be regulated by The Board. The data on generation by Price Newfoundand Limited was supplied by them to the Newfoundland and Labrador Power Commission. Electric power generated by industrial establishments for their own use would not be recorded in this table.

The industrial consumption of electric energy is based, in part, on data collected by the Manufacturing and Primary Industries Division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in the Census of Manufacturers reports. Because these reports are concerned primarily with consumers rather than producers of electric energy and are completed on the basis of different concepts and for different reporting periods, considerable difficulty is encountered in reconciling the two sets of data. For example, energy transferred between two establishments within the same organization may be reported under the purchases in "Census of Manufacturers" reports, but as produced for own use in "Electric Power Statistics" reports.

Consumption of electric power for certain manufacturing groups is confidential because of the limited number of firms in any one group. As a result only the total manufacturing consumption is shown.

"Net Generating Capability Within Province" is the maximum net kilowatt output (after station service) available from the generating facilities of the Utility, System or Industrial Establishment with all equipment available at the time of the annual Firm Power Peak Load, determined as the average kilowatt output for one hour with no allowance for outages of generating units.

"Firm Power Peak Load Within Province" is the demand for power from firms and individuals that operate within the boundaries of the province.

"Firm Energy Requirement" is the energy required to meet firm obligations, or for use in own industrial plant other than secondary energy.

"Gross Capability" is the same as net generating capability plus the receipts of power from other provinces.

"Firm Power Peak Load on Province" includes demand for firm power by other provinces, as well as the load within, noted in "Firm Power Peak Load Within the Province".

"Indicated Reserve" is the net capability less indicated firm power peak load within the province or gross capability less firm power peak load on the province.

The introduction of home and auto supply stores recognizes the diversification by many retailers previously classed as accessories, tires and battery stores into additional commodity lines not normally associated with the automatic trade.

To isolate small neighbourhood stores whose grocery content has been largely diluted by a variety of unrelated merchandise, the new classification of "Grocery, confectionery and sundries" was established.

Another significant change from previous censuses has been made in the "Department Store" classification. Catalogue sales data, formerly included with department store sales data, have been allocated to the "General merchandise store" classification. In addition, non-department store locations of department store organizations were reclassified to their appropriate categories.

Provincial Government Employees and their Gross Payrolls consists of employees in "Departmental Services", "Provincial Institutions of Higher Education", "Provincial Government Enterprises", and "Workmen's Compensation Boards".

"Departmental Services" are also known as General Fund activities. This comprises the activities carried on by provincial governments as reflected in their Estimates and in addition, expenditures on employment by special or administrative funds.

"Provincial Institutions of Higher Education" are educational institutions at the university level which are under the control of the provincial government, but which are not administered under departmental authority. In Newfoundland this would only include Memorial University of Newfoundland.

"Provincial Government Enterprises" are self reporting administrative bodies established by government to produce goods and services for sale to governments or others at a price to the users designed to compensate largely or wholly for the costs or to yield a profit. For the latest full list of Provincial Government Enterprises see D.B.S. Provincial Government Employment April-June, 72-007, p. 23.

"Gross Payrolls" are the payrolls of all persons paid for work done during the month whether they were still employed at the end of the month or not. They include retroactive pay, salary adjustments and overtime payments.

Comparability Between Numbers and Earnings:

The user of these statistics is advised to avoid making direct comparison between the numbers of employees reported and the payrolls reported. The reason is that numbers relate to the last day of the month wherever possible and otherwise to the final pay period of the month. Since in certain categories, especially casual employment, considerable fluctuations in numbers employed occur during a month, a comparison between the payrolls of all persons employed during the month and the number still employed at the end of the month would not be valid in many cases.
